

What Makes IT Projects Risky?

- * New technology
- * Compatibility issues with existing technology
- * New languages / architectures to learn
- * Product can be changed at any moment
- * Increased need to deliver to market quickly

How can you tell if the project is on track?




Five Common Signs

Lack of Executive Support





Lack of Executive Support

- * Executive support is critical to any project's success
- * Executives can help a project:
 - ✓ Indirectly, by communicating its value to their stakeholders
 - ✓ Directly, by providing resources and support to remove barriers
- * Executives can threaten a project:
 - ✓ Indirectly, by tying up needed resources or speaking out negatively
 - ✓ Directly, by killing the project

How do you get and keep executives on board?



How to Overcome

- * Keep executives engaged
 - ✓ Stakeholder management integrated with communication plan
- * Show the impact of decisions
 - ✓ If resources are pulled, what does that do to the schedule?
 - ✓ Data helps executives make decisions
- * Encourage a stakeholder to be a project champion
 - √ That person can help communicate the value to executives



Lack of Stakeholder Engagement





Lack of Stakeholder Engagement

- * Stakeholders drive project resources
 - ✓ Not just executives
 - ✓ Functional managers, middle managers, subject matter experts
- * Consequences of lack of engagement:
 - ✓ Missed opportunities
 - Additional resources
 - Experience to help in project planning and execution
 - ✓ Increased risk
 - May be missing someone who needs to give input
 - Someone who feels left out can become a barrier

How do you keep stakeholders engaged?



How to Overcome

- * Make sure ALL stakeholders are identified
 - ✓ No one who affects or is affected by the project should be missing.
- * Use an engagement matrix
 - ✓ Unaware, Resistant, Neutral, Supportive, Leading
 - ✓ Current Level of Engagement vs. Desired Level of Engagement

- * Plan a strategy to engage the stakeholders
 - √ Keep them in the loop
 - ✓ Work with them to improve engagement levels

Subject Matter Experts

- * Subject matter experts (SMEs) are commonly overloaded
 - √ This presents another risk since their input is vital
- * Make sure for each subject matter expert, you know:
 - ✓ What their schedule is
 - ✓ What you need from them
 - ✓ When you need it

These steps help improve SME engagement



Expectations Mismatch Between Stakeholder / Team





Expectations Mismatch

- * Expectations mismatch can cause two problems:
 - ✓ Project work stalls because developers don't know what to do
 - Leads to delays
 - ✓ Developers don't code the right solution
 - Leads to frustration among stakeholders, expensive rework
- * Expectations mismatch commonly results from:
 - ✓ Lack of effective scope documentation
 - ✓ Missing / underrepresented stakeholders
 - ✓ Lack of code or design review

How can you clarify scope and minimize rework?



How to Overcome

* Make sure stakeholder expectations are communicated

- * Make sure the scope is understood and validated
 - ✓ Understood by team, accepted by customer

- * Conduct code / design reviews
 - ✓ Have stakeholders present if possible so they can give feedback



Frequently Missed Deadlines





Frequently Missed Deadlines

- * When the team consistently misses its deadlines:
 - √ Team morale slips
 - Executives and other stakeholders get more anxious
 - ✓ Costs increase due to extra time and budgets are overrun
 - ✓ Other projects can be impacted

How can you get your project back on track?



How to Overcome

- * Perform root cause analysis
 - ✓ To avoid future problems, find out what caused current problems.
 - ✓ Without this step, problems could continue
- * Follow up with team daily
 - ✓ Team and PM need to know what's slipping, what new dates are
 - √ What issues are arising that the project manager can address?
- * Report weekly to stakeholders
 - ✓ Stakeholders need to know project status and be reassured
 - ✓ Reports will help them communicate with their superiors



Ineffective Change Control





Ineffective Change Control

- * Changes should be expected on any project
 - ✓ Especially IT with software products that are intangible.
- * Changes can come on an IT project for many reasons:
 - ✓ Incompatibility with legacy systems / vendor products
 - ✓ Compliance with regulations
 - ✓ Discovery of critical / showstopper issues during testing.
- * Ineffective change control results in confusion

How can you make change control more effective?



How to Overcome

* Develop a strong change control process

- ✓ Make sure everyone knows how to submit a change request.
- ✓ Verify the chain of command for approving change requests.
- ✓ Create strong documentation for changes

* Consider agile

- ✓ Agile welcomes changes, even late
- ✓ Need to determine if organization is strong fit.



Other Challenges

- * Ineffective / weak project manager
- * Weak commitment of project team
- * Team members lack knowledge and skills
- * Lack of documented requirements, success criteria
- * Ineffective schedule planning / management
- * Resources assigned to a higher priority project
- * No business case for the project



Conclusion

- * Many other challenges


