Sprint Planning Terminology

- **1. Sprint** a time-box of typically 2-4 weeks during which the scrum team completes a specified set of work and makes it ready for review
- 2. Sprint Planning the first event in scrum that officially kicks off the sprint
- **3. Product Backlog** a prioritized list of work for the development team to create for the product; Most important items are placed at the top.
- **4. Sprint Backlog** a list of work items the dev team plans to complete in a given sprint
- **5. User Story** Brief description of a specific functionality a user needs (e.g. As an online shopper, I need the ability to save items to a wishlist so I can revisit my choices later.)
- **6. Story Points** Unit to measure size and effort associated with a particular story





Why Sprint Planning?

The primary objective of sprint planning is for the team to agree on what the sprint goal is and what work will be performed during the sprint.

The sprint planning meeting should address these three questions:

- 1. Why is this sprint valuable? Or What is the goal of the sprint?
- 2. What can be DONE (committed work) in this sprint?
- **3. How** would the committed work get done?





Best Practices – Before Sprint Planning

- 1. Timebox the Sprint Planning. Max 4 hours for a 2-week sprint. Typically, it will be 1-2 hours.
- 2. Work with the Product Owner to make sure the backlog is fully refined and groomed leading into sprint planning.
- 3. If a backlog item does not meet its Definition of Done (DoD) ready, it should not be included in the sprint.



Best Practices – Before Sprint Planning

- 4. The team needs to know their velocity and capacity. Ideally, the team should have velocity from the last three sprints.
- 5. They can get capacity from a tool like RefineM's Sprint Capacity Planning Sheet
- 6. Reserve about 20% capacity (from 10-30%) for adhoc/exceptions and potential non-sprint work. Remaining 80% is capacity for meeting the sprint goal.



Best Practices - During the Meeting

- 1. Team estimates each item and breaks it down into tasks as needed.
- Team should define the sprint goal (should be 1-2 lines)
- 3. Ideally, the team should include at least one retrospective action item in the current sprint's backlog.



Best Practices - During the Meeting

- 4. Determine target velocity based on last 3 sprints and 80% capacity utilization guideline.
- 5. Create and review the burndown chart and make sure the goal is achievable.
- 6. Refine the sprint goals based on target velocity and burndown, as needed.
- 7. Update the sprint backlog in the tool.
- 8. Document decisions.



Best Practices - After the Meeting

- 1. Team uses "pull" method to pick stories from the top of the sprint backlog and start working on one story at a time.
- 2. Each team member should report progress on his/her story in real time, or at least daily.
